Pneumonia and Diarrhoea Fast Facts

"In spite of the huge toll on human life and the simplicity and costeffectiveness of necessary interventions, relatively few global resources are dedicated to tackling these conditions. The public health investment in the control of childhood pneumonia and diarrhoea is not commensurate with the magnitude of these problems...Children are dying because those most at risk are not reached...Use of effective interventions remains too low." Integrated Global Action Plan for Prevention and Control of Pneumonia and Diarrhoea (GAPPD)

By the Numbers

- Together, pneumonia and diarrhoea are responsible for nearly one-third of deaths in children under age five
- These diseases claim almost 2 million young lives each year
- Nearly 90% of these deaths occur in sub-Saharan Africa and Southeast Asia
- Nearly as many children died from pneumonia and diarrhoea as from AIDS, malaria, measles, meningitis, injuries and all other post-neonatal conditions combined

Pneumonia and diarrhoea are two of the leading killers of children worldwide.

While tremendous progress has been made and child deaths have plummeted—from 12 million in 1990 to fewer than 7 million in 2011—too many children are still dying from pneumonia and diarrhoea. With better access to lifesaving prevention and treatment solutions and an integrated approach to fighting these diseases, countless lives can be saved.
